THE BATTLE OF MANILA
The Spanish fleet, under the command of Admiral Montojo, was defeated by the American fleet, under the command of Admiral Dewey, in the bay of Manila on May 1, 1898. The Spanish fleet consisted of ten battleships, five cruisers, and several smaller vessels. The American fleet consisted of three battleships, five cruisers, and several smaller vessels. 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MERRITT'S PROCLAMATION.
GOVERNMENT FOR MANILA.

Manila, Aug. 18, 1898, p. m.—General Merritt has prepared a proclamation to the natives which provides for the establishment of a government for Manila and the surrounding territory, and the other islands in our possession. The chief point being to give a right protection to all persons in the region. Municipal law, local tribunals and other institutions for the punishment of crime to remain as in the further notice, except in cases incompatible with military rule, subject to the supervision of the American General. Provisions are made for the power to arrest and detain all persons necessary to the public peace and safety. To open roads and other means of communication to be vigorously protected. They Declined The Honor.
Washington, Aug. 17.—The President today declared to Senator Allison, Iowa, an appointment as a member of the peace commission, Senator Allison, however, would not see his way clear to accept the honor. Senator Allison is now awaiting the honor offered, and said that the interests of his State in the Senate and his desire to continue his former vigorous participation in the shaping of legislation in that body, and other duties, would preclude his taking up the appointment as a member of the peace commission.

It is understood that the President has declined to Senator Allison, of Iowa, a place on the peace commission, and that he has declined the honor. The President is still looking for another suitable Senator to ask.

Exchanged Felicitations.
President McKinley and President Faure of France have exchanged felicitations on the relations of the two countries, and expressions of mutual esteem of the two chief executives. The message of the Spanish ambassador to the President of the United States, through circuit between the White House at Washington and the French House at Paris, and the President's answer at the White House, were those of President McKinley and Ambassador Cambon, the French ambassador to the United States, the first secretary and Ambassador Cambon, young son of the Secretary of State Moore, and Representative Taylor of Ohio.

The message from McKinley is as follows:
To His Excellency the Honorable President of the U. S. A.—It affords me special pleasure to inaugurate the new submarine communication which unites more directly than heretofore our two countries, by addressing to you an expression of the feeling of sincere sympathy existing between the French Republic and the Republic of the United States. I desire also to convey to you, as President, the assurance of my highest esteem and constant friendship.

President McKinley sent the following response:
To His Excellency the Honorable President of the Republic of France.—I am happy to believe that the addition to the means of communication between our two countries can serve only to reciprocate and to strengthen that feeling of cordial good will which has so characteristically marked their relations both early and in later times. I desire, Mr. President, to return to your expressions of esteem and friendship.

(Special.)—When McKinley's message today is received at the French capital, the President of the Republic will be expected to send a message of reply to the President of the United States.

The completion of the submarine cable between the United States and France, which has been the subject of so much interest, was completed today. The cable, which was laid by the French company, will be in operation by the end of the month. The cable will be used for the transmission of telegrams and for the transmission of news.
